Woman Composer Sunday—March 10, 2024

This Sunday, March 10th has been designated as Woman Composer Sunday by the American Guild of Organists (AGO), the Society of Women Organists, and the Royal College of Organists. All organists have been asked to play or have their choirs sing a work by a woman composer.

Our tribute to women composers includes the following musical selections to recognize the important contributions that women composers have made to the choral and organ repertoire. Each composer represents a specific style of composition from the Romanticism of Elizabeth Stirling's *Largo* to the other worldly use of chant and modes used in *Meditazione quaresimale sopra Emendemus in Melius* by Carlotta Ferrari, to the stirring rhythmic arrangement of *I Will Arise* by Alice Parker and Robert Shaw to the stately chordal punctuation *Psalm* composed by Dorothy Wells.

Prelude

Largo from Eight Movements for the Organ, by Elizabeth Stirling (1819-1895)

Born in London in 1819, Elizabeth Stirling was educated at home and studied organ, piano, and harmony privately at the Royal Academy of Music. After her father's business failed when she was 16 years old, Stirling began to earn a living as a musician becoming a respected composer, church musician and recitalist. She was known for her impressive pedal technique and is believed to be the first person to perform J.S.Bach's "St. Anne" Prelude and Fugue at a public recital in Britain. In 1856, Stirling applied for a music degree at Oxford University by submitting an original choral composition. Although this work was approved, Stirling was not admitted to the university, since women were not eligible for degrees at the time. Despite this, she went on to serve in church positions for decades. Additionally, she composed numerous organ works, over 50 songs and duets, and several arrangements of music by Bach, Handel, and Mozart.

Offertory Anthem

I Will Arise, arr. by Alice Parker (1925-2023) and Robert Shaw (1916-1999)

Composer, conductor and teacher, Alice Parker was born in Boston, MA in 1925. She began composing early and wrote her first orchestral score while still in high school. She graduated from Smith College with a major in music performance and composition, then receiving her master's degree from the Julliard School where she studied choral conducting with Robert Shaw. Her life-work has been in choral and vocal music, combining composing, conducting and teaching in a creative balance. Her arrangements with Robert Shaw of folksongs, hymns and spirituals form an enduring repertoire for choruses all around the world. She has been commissioned by such groups as the Vancouver Chamber Chorus, the Atlanta Symphony Chorus and Chanticleer. In 1985, she founded Melodious Accord, Inc., a non-profit group which presents choral concerts, sponsors workshops and symposia. Her techniques have encouraged a generation of music teachers and choral conductors to think about music and the act of conducting in new ways. No less an authority than Robert Shaw himself has said of

Parker that "...she possesses a rare and creative musical intelligence." She has made thirteen acclaimed recordings and has published books on melodic styles, choral improvisation and 'Good Singing in Church'. In 2010, as part of the Melodious Accord 25th Anniversary, *The Alice Parker Melodious Accord Hymnal* was introduced. Five videos have appeared, showing her extensive work with hymns and folksongs. She has been recognized by Chorus America, the American Guild of Organists, the American Choral Directors Association, The Hymn Society and Choral Arts New England for her lifetime contributions to choral music. She is the recipient of six honorary doctorates and the Smith College Medal.

Communion Music

Meditazione quaresimale sopra Emendemus in Melius by Carlotta Ferrari (b.1975)

An Italian composer, Carlotta Ferrari was born in 1975 and has composed in many genres, developing a personal language that is concerned with the blend of past and present. Her compositions have been performed in venues such as Westminster Choir College, Melbourne Cathedral, Steinway Haus in Hamburg, National Center for Performing Arts in Beijing and St. George's Hanover Square in London to mention a few. She served as the chair of music composition at Hebei Normal University in Shijiazhuang, China and was a professor of music composition at the ESE, Firenze, Italy. She holds degrees from the Conservatories of Milano and Firenze. Ferrari had a lecture-recital given on her music in May of 2017 at Harvard University, organized by the Boston Chapter of the American Guild of Organists during WIMfest (Women in Music Festival). In 2013, she won the 2nd place award at the edition of Sisi-Frezza competition for women composers and the 2nd place award at the 2018 edition of Opus Ignotum Choral Composition Competition and in 2022, she won the shared 1st place award at ISCM-Musika Bulegoa Choral Composition Competition in Spain. Ferrari's music appears on several CD recordings, such as the monographic "Women of History: Music for Organ by Carlotta Ferrari" and Carson Cooman, organ (Divine Arts Recordings). She has lectured at universities such as La Sorbonne, Paris, Bangor University and Newcastle University, UK.

Postlude

Psalm of Glory by Dorothy Wells (1926-2008)

Dorothy Wells attended Ohio Wesleyan University, majoring in Piano and Organ. She began playing the piano at the age of 5, the organ at 12 and violin at 14. While in high school, she played the piano and violin in the orchestra and accompanied instrumental and vocal students for their solo performances; she also wrote the music for the school's Alma Mater. At 14 she began playing the organ for services at Sidney's First United Methodist Church. While in college, Dorothy was appointed to Pi Kappa Lambda (music honorary) and was a member of Mu Phi Epsilon (music fraternity). In 1964, she joined the Lorenz Music Publishing editorial team, for three decades, her main responsibility was serving as the editor of Lorenz's popular bi-monthly magazine, *The Organ Portfolio*, as well as compiling, arranging and composing music for Lorenz Publishing Co. She served as organist at Fairmont Presbyterian Church, Faith Lutheran Church and St. Paul Lutheran Church in the Dayton, Ohio area.

Peanut Butter and Jamboree dates are April 7th and June 2nd. We need donations of peanut butter, jam (which is easier to spread) white bread, sandwich bags and parchment paper. We are supplying sandwiches to the Holy Grill in Pompano and Laundry Love.

Dear All Saints Friends,

Because All Saints is such an essential partner of Ninos Creadores de Historia School, I wanted to share with you some of the challenges confronting us, but more importantly, the many successes we have been blessed with.

The academic school year started two weeks ago. Sofie, the school teacher, and her small staff have been preparing the school facility for the new school year. Living in the shadows of an active volcano makes cleaning dust and grit an unending task here.

This week, we opened one of the two boxes of books you sent. I can speak for all of us here; seeing so many beautiful children's books was simply overwhelming. Books like these are rare treasures in Guatemala. Sofie is currently selecting the books she wants to keep for the school permanently. We will likely give our students some of the remaining books to keep so they can start their own library at home.

Our after-school program focuses on academically at-risk first and second-graders. Teachers at our community's primary school refer children struggling with learning and would likely only advance to the next grade with help.

Please forgive me for boasting a little. The Guatemalan government estimates that a staggering 40% of all the students attending public schools are held back at least one year during their grade school years, most frequently first grade. With that said, 33 of the 35 atrisk students participating in our after-school program were promoted to the next grade, a 94% success rate. I could not be more proud of our students and the dedicated school staff that made this possible.

We've learned that students behind academically are also the most hungry. The Guatemalan government estimates that 50% of the country's children are malnourished. We also know that hungry children don't learn, and because of that, Ninos Creadores de Historia provides every student with a simple but nutritious lunch. For many of them, this will be their main meal of the day. Their parents are encouraged, knowing their children will receive five nutritious meals each week of school.

Our goal for this school year is to have 40 students in two sessions, one in the morning and a second in the afternoon. This means adding a teacher's aide and five more young mouths to feed. Last year, we could cover the cost of 700 lunches each month (.71 per meal) for about \$500. Inflation has hit the food market hard here; our food costs will likely increase around 25% this year.

Last year's school year ended in late November. As our tradition, we had an end-of-school party with plenty of games, dancing, pizza, cake, and piñatas filled with candy. It's the one day we throw nutrition to the wind. We did a larger than usual end-of-the-year gift bag for the kids. The students received a bag filled with school supplies and fun stuff for kids, much of which was generously provided by All Saints. Each child's family also received a large food bag and a roasted chicken.

Thank you so much for the large box of medical supplies you sent us in the fall. We gave the supplies to a local medical facility in exchange for a daylong free clinic for all of our students and their siblings. The clinic was delighted to receive the much-needed supplies, and we were so happy to be able to arrange for a day of free health care for our students and their siblings.

This school year, we aim to have WiFi service for the students. Your wonderful All Saints Mission Folks transformed our humble building with its bare cinder block walls into a brightly painted and inviting learning center. Unfortunately, it is time once again to paint the building's interior. If history is any indicator, helping hands always appear when needed.

Blessings abound here at Ninos Creadores de Historia; thank you for making that possible. All Saints is vital to this ministry of helping God's children in Guatemala. Your love is God in so many lives.

Please visit us; we would love to show you your generosity at work.

ARE THERE BATS IN THE BELFRY?

Hopefully, it is generally understood that the long time All Saints practice of ringing 13 bells prior to Eucharist not only provides an aural signal that the parish is gathering and preparing for worship, but also that each tolling represents one of the twelve Saints for which the Parish is named, then (after a brief pause) one final thirteenth ring in the name of Christ.

This practice has been brought inside while the efforts to repair the exterior bell continue. But wait! There is something different. Yes. The pitch of the 13th bell began a journey the first Sunday of Lent. Rather than being the same as the other twelve, the sound for Jesus is moving one step up the musical scale toward the octave completion on Easter Sunday. Joyful Laetare Sunday will resound with the interval of a Perfect Fifth. Palm Passion Sunday, the beginning of Holy Week, will be punctuated by the unsettling, but hopeful "leading tone" of the Major Seventh.

The 13th chime on Easter Sunday will be replaced with a Four Bell Full Peal. The celebratory practice of the constant ringing of every possible sequence of the bells used. Wondering how many sequences there are? See you Sunday, March 31st!

The Great Vigil of Easter. What's so great about it?

Listen! Do you want to know a secret? Do you promise not to tell? No, no, no! Wait, once you know it, we want you to tell!

For many of us who grew up in a Western liturgical tradition, Episcopal, Roman, Presbyterian, Lutheran, or Methodist, our primary experience of Easter has been at the Eucharist on Easter Sunday morning. But did you know that each of these faith traditions, including our own, acknowledge that THE primary liturgy of Easter Day is not on Easter morning but the one that begins after dark on Easter Eve?

This service, properly named the Great Vigil of Easter, is the mother of all vigils, including the one we keep on Christmas Eve. It is the first celebration of Jesus' resurrection on Easter and the central liturgy of the church year. It is the culmination of the three-day liturgy called the Triduum, which begins on Maundy Thursday and ends with the joyful Eucharist celebrated at the end of the vigil on Easter Eve. We keep watch and wait for the celebration of the resurrection in a liturgy that is only second in age to the celebration of the Eucharist itself.

It makes full and resplendent use of the primal gifts of fire and water. It embraces us in shadows and darkness as we hear and respond to the telling of our salvation story through the prophets, many prophets, in the glow of the paschal candle lit from a roaring fire. It is a time for those entering the church to be baptized and for us to renew our baptismal vows with newly blessed water. It is time to make a joyful noise with bells and noisemakers and loud alleluias as the announcement of Christ's resurrection is made and the Eucharist itself is celebrated in the midst of beautiful flowers and vestments that convey our joy in Jesus 's resurrection and the sure hope of our own. Our senses are overwhelmed with sights and sounds and scents and taste.

This service has four major parts: Light, Word, Water, and Eucharist. And yes, it is longer than most, but this is the Passover of the Lord, and no one hurries through a Passover.

Look for more information on each part in the coming weeks. But mark your calendars now. **March 30, 2024, at 7:00 pm**. Tell others! Bring them! And whether you've been to a vigil or not, join us in keeping this Great Vigil of Easter.
